#### 1.) CALL MEETING TO ORDER

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> calls the September 25<sup>th</sup>, 2019 Commission Meeting to order at 9:03 A.M.

#### 2.) Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance

Invocation lead by Nick Sedillo

#### 3.) Changes to the Agenda

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that there are 2 changes that need to be made to the agenda. Item 13-A, the presentation from the 4-H members, needs to be moved up on the agenda after the public comment because the children need to return to school. The next change will be with Item 14-A in the Executive Session, that item needs to be removed from the agenda.

#### 4.) PROCLAMATIONS

There were none presented.

#### 5.) CERTIFICATES AND AWARDS

There were none presented.

#### 6.) BOARD AND COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS

There were no appointments made.

#### 7.) PUBLIC COMMENT and COMMUNICATIONS

<u>Albert Beckwith</u> states that he had one of his issues resolved right before the meeting began. He also states that he was under the impression that the comments made in the room stayed in this room, he understands the meeting is a public record, but people need to keep their comments to themselves and not talk bad about a person. We should all get along and live in peace.

Alfonso Otero states that he is a resident of Torrance County and has looked at the map of the Commission districts in the county. He noticed that Commission District 3 is a very large district. It seems like a very large area for just one Commissioner and is curious as to why there is only one Commissioner for that District. There should be another Commissioner so that there is more representation for the residents in District 3.

<u>Linda Jaramillo</u> states that she would like to announce that early and absentee voting begins on October 8<sup>th</sup>, 2019. The hours will be Monday through Thursday from 7:30 am to 5:30 pm here in the administrative building where the Sheriff's department was located.

**Betty Cabber** states that she would like to let everyone know about services for Bob Ayre. Mr. Ayre was the former Torrance County Manager. The services will be held Sunday September 29<sup>th</sup>, 2019 at 2:00 pm at the Moriarty Civic Center

#### 13.) DISCUSSION

a.) EXTENSION OFFICE: 4-H Update, presentation from 4-H kids.

<u>Jill Encinias</u> states that she would like to thank the Commission for having them this morning. She is here to give a brief update on the 4-H program. The calendar year runs from October to October. They are finishing up the current calendar year and are preparing for the 2019-2020 year.

Last year 4-H had a total of 144 members enrolled and 43 adult volunteers. Ms. Encinias states that she is a data person and wanted to know the percentage and with the number of kids in the county that 144 is only 7% of those eligible to join 4-H Her goal is to raise that number.

The theme for this year's 4-H is, Inspire Kids to Do. Ms. Encinias' second goal is to expand. She wants to expand the mind set of what youth can do through 4-H. Raising livestock and showing at the fair will continue, but kids need to know about all the other programs that 4-H can offer. She did bring some 4-H youth with her to the meeting to highlight there accomplishments. These youth have the opportunity to compete in local, state, and national levels.

<u>Jonathon Aday</u> states that he is with the Torrance County Meats team. His group competed in July and won the state competition for meats. They will be traveling to the American Royal Livestock Show in Kansas City October 14<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup> to judge at the national 4-H meats contest.

What the meats contest consists of is the group judging 30 different retail cuts of beef, pork, and lamb. They also judge retail classes and justify the reasons why they placed those classes

the way they did. Some skills that you can learn from this are leadership skills and public speaking.

<u>Bella Neish</u> states that she is here representing the Torrance County Livestock Judging team. Her team also competed in July and won the state championship for livestock evaluation through 4-H. The livestock judging team will be traveling to Louisville, KY November 19<sup>th</sup> & 20<sup>th</sup> to compete at the North American International Livestock Exposition.

This contest consist of them judging 2 aspects of livestock, those consist of market and breeding. This consists of 4 different species of beef, sheep, goats, and swine. For each one you will evaluate them from best to worst and then at the end give the reasons as to why you rated them that way. It's highly competitive and takes a lot of focus. A life skill that we gain from this is to explain why you rate them as such and to stand up for you decisions, and being confident in yourself.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> asks, by going to these judging contests, what kind of doors does this open for them in terms of college and jobs after high school.

<u>Bella Neish</u> states that she has been judging livestock since she was 8 years old. Her goal is to go to college and judge competitively at that level. This will offer many scholarships and help pay for school. This gives us more opportunities to work with other teams and compete in a fun way as well as gain skills on what to do if one decides to run a livestock operation. It helps us prepare for the path we are taking.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> congratulates the kids on their accomplishments and asks the audience to give them a round of applause.

Commissioner McCall states that as they have heard there are few individuals in this county that represented the county very well. Those people were Jade Perea who won grand champion sheep and Cash Wrye with reserve sheep. Torrance County was represented very well in the sheep barn at the New Mexico State Fair. As you hear what they do collectively as a team they still strive to do their best individually. The best thing about this program is that it teaches both team and individual ways to learn.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve the consent agenda. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. No discussion, all Commissioners in favor. <u>MOTION CARRIED</u>

#### 10.) ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE/AMENDMENT TO COUNTY CODE

There was nothing presented.

#### 11.) ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION

**a.) COMMISSION:** Motion to approve the creation of the Torrance County Land Grant Advisory Board. Resolution 2019-52. (Sanchez)

Wayne Johnson states that there was a small typo in line 10 of the resolution. It reads "has desires" and it should just read "desires."

<u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> states that they are thinking of creating this board, however the land grants are still in discussions for this matter and he is requesting that this item be deferred until the next meeting.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> makes a motion to defer this item until the next Commission Meeting. <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. <u>ITEM DEFFERED</u>

**b.) COMMISSION:** Motion to approve the creation of the Heritage Center Advisory Board. Resolution 2019-53. (Sanchez)

<u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> states that he is proposing the creation of a committee to work with the auspices of the county towards the creation of a feasibility study. This committee will work on gathering the information to give to a contractor that could possibly work on the study for the county. He would like to keep the committee simple with the land grants and the municipalities, but also include the Moriarty Historical Society and a non-voting member being the park service.

We are not ready to make appointments at today's meeting but we could create the committee and appoint them at one of the next couple of meetings and allow the members to come to the meeting.

So far we have recommendations from Estancia, Mountainair, Torreon, Tajique, Manzano, and the Historical Society. The recommendation from Estancia is Ted Barela, from Mountainair is Mayor Peter Nieto, from Manzano is Land Grant President Jason Quintana, from Torreon it is Leo Chavez, from Tajique it is Johnny Romero, and from the historical museum is Jace

Alderson or Tina. The park service is willing to participate and their recommendation is either Norma Pineda or Tom Dets.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> asks if it is prudent to have government officials, from the park service, sitting on a committee of this nature.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that he does not have a clear answer on this. He is concerned about federal regulations in regards to employees serving on a board such as this and it being a voting membership. In order for this board to function the park service would need to have an exofficio type of position to sit on the board.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> states that he thinks the land grants should only have 1 vote since most of their concerns are common and not separate.

<u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> states that he does not think there is anything to vote on at this point. That is something that can be ironed out later. This is just the committee working with the contractor for a feasibility study.

<u>Commissioner McCall</u> states that with that being said he thinks it is too early to create this committee until the studies come out.

<u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> states that this will not cost anything. This would be a great benefit for the contractor. It is good to have a group of people to work with that is speaking for the communities. The information gathering is more observational, it is critical that we have the local partners involved so that we make sure all the information is present.

<u>Commissioner McCall</u> states that there is already an ad hoc committee formed for this, is that correct?

<u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> replies, yes, but that is exactly what it is ad hoc. In order for it to maintain its organizational integrity, it needs to run under the auspices of the county that way we maintain control and have adequate information

<u>Commissioner McCall</u> states that he fills the ad hoc committee would be able to help these studies enough to get their feet wet. He fills it is premature to create this committee.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> states that he agrees with Commissioner McCall. In light of the current grant they have, he would like to see more of that, and he also has more questions for his district that he needs answered.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to defer this item until the next meeting. <u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. ITEM TABLED

c.) FINANCE: Motion to approve Budget Increase from HB6 distribution. Resolution 2019-54

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that we normally do not find money in our distributions. This is from HB6 and resulted in an increase distribution to the county. The state is changing it's GRT collection process from one that is point of business to point of service. Therefore we need to request a budget increase to absorb the funds.

Jeremy Oliver states that the amount giving is \$59,000.00. The manager's office has decided to invest the money in vehicles for the different department for basic maintenance and repairs.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve Budget Increase from HB6 distribution. Resolution 2019-54. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. No discussion, all Commissioners in favor. MOTION CARRIED

**d.) MANAGER/GRANT COORDINATOR:** Motion to approve 2020 Census Complete Count Committee. Resolution 2019-55

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> states that this is a resolution that is required in order to receive funding from the state of New Mexico. We would need to form a complete count committee and they will be working through June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2020. The grant funding amount is \$24,219.00. The purpose of the committee is to raise awareness of the US Census and mobilize action to increase self-response by people within the county, especially those in hard to count areas. This is beneficial to most of our grant funding, the appropriations are based on the census counts for the county. Ms. Allen is asking for the Commission's approval on this resolution

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Commissioner McCall</u> makes a motion to approve 2020 Census Complete Count Committee. Resolution 2019-55. <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> seconds the motion and asks if there are people that are going to sit on the committee. <u>Cheryl Allen</u> replies, yes, there are 4 items that follow along with this resolution. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. **MOTION CARRIED** 

#### 12.) APPROVALS

**a.)** MANAGER/GRANT COORDINATOR: Motion to approve Intergovernmental Grant Agreement for Complete Count effort for U.S. Census

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> states that this is an agreement between Torrance County and the State of New Mexico to obtain the funding for the Complete Count Committee. This funding will help them to do promotions and an outreach effort in Torrance County.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> asks if the motion needs to be made to authorize the County Manager to sign the grant agreement.

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> replies, yes, that is correct. The signature line requires that the County Manager sign the grant agreement.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Commissioner McCall</u> makes a motion to approve the Intergovernmental Grant Agreement for Complete Count effort for U.S. Census and to allow County Manager

Johnson to sign the agreement. <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> seconds the motion. No discussion, all Commissioners in favor. **MOTION CARRIED** 

**b.)** MANAGER/GRANT COORDINATOR: Motion to approve Torrance County Complete Count Committee Members

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> states that they have already started to assemble the committee. They have already spoke to the individuals and received their letters of intent. Letters hereto attached. The committee members are Peggy Schwebach, chair, Shannon Cobb, co-chair, Angela Creamer, Melissa Fox, and Kathleen Jesse are all members. The county member will be Kassandra Sandy, and is the complete count committee coordinator.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that this is the beginning committee. Should there be a need to add additional members they have the ability to do so. This needs to get taken care of because this all has to be turned in today so that we can get the \$24,000.00 in grant funding.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> states, as he understands, there is no limitations on committee members and what we are looking for is community members with the knowledge to do this job.

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> states that the states has given a limitation of up to 30 committee members. She wants to reach out to other areas of the county. So far Moriarty, Duran, Encino, and Willard have no representation. We want to make sure every area is represented.

**Chairman Schwebach** asks if they can add the committee members as needed.

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> replies, yes, the members can be added at any time.

<u>Commissioner McCall</u> asks if the members can just be added or will the request to add the new members have to be brought to the Commission for approval.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that it is up to the Commission if they want to allow the committee to appoint or bring the appointment to the Commission for approval.

**ACTION TAKEN:** <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve the Torrance County Complete County Committee members and to authorize the committee to add new members as they see fit. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> asks if there is any further discussion.

<u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> asks what the requirements are to serve on the committee.

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> states that the US Census Bureau has developed a guide that lists activities and publications that they may want to pursue. The state has also developed templates that the committee can use to prepare different types of media to get the word out. The census count will also be available on line and they are wanting to a have a location where citizens can go with train individuals to assist in the on line process. This is one reason Angela Creamer was

selected, she works at the library and will have the training to assist those using the online process.

<u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> asks when the committee will meet and if there will be per diem for the workers.

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> states that they will leave the times the meeting will take place up to the committee members.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that there is no per diem as of yet. If it comes to that it must come to the Commission for approval. We are looking for people who want to serve and reach those hard to count areas of the county.

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> states that once they have established the committee members the state will be sending down personnel to train the committee as well as a representative who will develop any of the hard to count maps that will be handed over to the census bureau. There is funding available to train the committee members elsewhere if necessary and prepare the promotional items and make the outreach to the citizens of the county.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> one of the things the committee will help with is to determine the best way to spend the money to reach the maximum number of people. The have all sorts of options on how they use the money. Mr. Johnson prefers that the outreach be tailored specifically for Torrance County.

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> would like to add that they will be making outreach in the further regions of the county to get more committee members, we do not want to limit the members to the 5 they have now.

<u>Commissioner McCall</u> states that he would like it if Kassandra could update the Commissioners and staff with a quick email on what is going on and if the committee has any questions or concerns. It is important to know where we are at and what we are doing.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that Kassandra is an employee in the assessor's office and this is going to be extra work for her. Mr. Johnson thanks Kassandra for taking on this task.

<u>Kassandra Sandy</u> states that part of the goal in communicating with Ms. Allen was to get any financial updates, any needs from the county or the Commission, and communications between herself and the other committee members. She just wants an open line of communication. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. **MOTION CARRIED** 

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> asks if there are any of the members of the Committee present and says that he would like to thank them for volunteering. This is a lot of work and is very important to the county. If in the future you see anything that the county needs to facilitate, do not hesitate to ask.

c.) MANAGER/GRANT COORDINATOR: Motion to approve outreach program for Complete Count effort for U.S. Census

<u>Cheryl Allen</u> states that this is the last part of the census item. This is for the approval of the outreach plan. It is a generalized plan that has been written by the state of New Mexico. The only contribution from the county was adding the complete county committee. They understand that this only a partial list of members and will be adding members to the list. The plan is an outline for the committee members to follow and adapt to the needs of Torrance County.

**ACTION TAKEN:** <u>Commissioner McCall</u> makes a motion to approve the outreach program for the Complete Count effort for U.S. Census. <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> seconds the motion. No discussion, all Commissioners in favor. **MOTION CARRIED** 

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that he would like to thank Ms. Allen for all of her hard work on this. We are playing catch-up with this and she has done an amazing job in getting this all together in a short amount of time.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> would also like to thank Ms. Allen for all of her hard work and for her improvement on speaking in front of the Commission.

**d.) FIRE:** Motion to approve publication for adoption of the 2015 International Fire Code and the 2015 International Wildland-Urban Interface Code for County Ordinance.

<u>Lester Gary</u> states that a few months back he was looking into the approval of the 2009 International Fire Code. He came to find out at the time the State adopted the 2015 International Fire Code. We pulled the 2009 from the agenda so that he could come forth with the 2015 version so that his department could be in compliance with the state.

What the Commission has before them is the ordinance that Mr. Gary and Mr. Butrick have been working on. This is still under review by the attorney and we are looking to have it completed by the week of the 7<sup>th</sup> so that we can publish this ordinance in the newspaper. Mr. Gary states he will also be meeting with P & Z to make sure everything in the IFC is compliant with what the county has already adopted. Mr. Gary is asking to have this published around the 9<sup>th</sup> of October and he will make copies and deliver it to the libraries so that the ordinance will be accessible to the public.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that these are alterations and not the IFC itself. We are trying to make sure that there are no conflicts with the existing ordinance and that we don't unintentionally create a scenario in Torrance County where it makes it difficult to build homes. One example is that a sprinkler system is required in any home that is built over 3,000 square feet.

Lester Gary states that as you read through this that is the proposed ordinance. There are amendments and deletions for that concern. We do not want to have any conflicts for residential or commercial structures that will come into the county. They have also looked at the International Wildland-Urban Interface Code. This goes with the IFC and will be looking for approval of this as well. We have so many areas that fall under the wildland jurisdiction that we are able to maintain. One example is the proper widths of roads in and out of different communities. For the homeowners, this is to make sure that we can get the fire apparatuses in and out of their areas as well.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> ask if this is a good starting point.

<u>John Butrick</u> replies, yes, that is correct.

**ACTION TAKEN:** <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve the publication for adoption of the 2015 International Fire Code and the 2015 International Wildland-Urban Interface Code for County Ordinance. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. **MOTION CARRIED** 

e.) FIRE: Motion to approve completion of Volunteer Fire Assistance Funding Grant.

Lester Gary states that this is a grant put out by the EMNRD, which is the state forestry division in the State of New Mexico. The grant is available and Mr. Gary would like to apply for the 10% matching grant and he is looking to hire a wild land coordinator. This grant, if awarded, will give us \$25,000.00 with a 10% match to hire the coordinator part time. This would allow us to establish a wildland attack division. This person would work closely with the grants coordinator to work on grants that are available to the department.

<u>Commissioner McCall</u> asks if there are people out there that would like a job like this that is part time.

Lester Gary replies, yes, there are people interested.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> asks if this is a renewable grant so that we can fund this part time position down the road.

Lester Gary replies, yes, there are several counties in the state that renew the grant. This grant is not only for staffing but is also for wildland firefighting equipment. With the position being in place and the regional mobilization plan we would have a team together and be able to deploy them to that fire. State and local agencies do get reimbursed therefore it brings money back to the county. Other agencies will use this grant to establish this position and once the other funding comes in the county would be able to make this position a full time position.

Commissioner McCall asks if Mr. Gary is going to pull the 10% match from his budget.

Lester Gary replies, yes.

**ACTION TAKEN:** <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve completion of Volunteer Fire Assistance Funding Grant. <u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. **MOTION CARRIED**

<u>Noah Sedillo</u> states that he has a floor substitute that he and Mr. Butrick worked on the day before, and he will pass that out now.

<u>John Butrick</u> states that most of the most of the changes were technical and non-substantive in nature. The only change that could be considered quasi substantive is in section 17 applicable law. In the section it was an addition of words and it talks about Torrance County and the contractor agree that the laws of the State of New Mexico shall govern. We added in "without giving effect to the choice of law principles thereof or any canon, custom, or rule of law requiring construction against the drafter and that venue will likely be in the 7<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Court in Torrance County.

Noah Sedillo states that the reason the Treasurer and Assessor want to go out to RFP is for consistency. The two departments send out different notices and bills throughout the year, and in using different vendors each time, there has been a lot of inconsistencies. In going out for RFP we can gain some consistencies and be in contract for the next 4 years, but there is a clause that will allow us an option to get out of the contract every year if we chose to do so. The amount is \$16,513.00, and does not include the GRT. The county will pay for overages, this has included there price point that they proposed, it is broken down to what each item will cost.

Commissioner McCall asks if each department will be responsible for their overages.

Noah Sedillo replies, yes, that is correct.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> ask how we are currently doing this procedure. He is also under the impression that the Treasurer and Assessors agree to this.

<u>Noah Sedillo</u> replies, yes, they both agree and Mr. Sedillo states that currently they have to go out and get 3 quotes and then award to the lowest quote. The two departments get with these vendors each time, it is a very time consuming process.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve RFP TC-FY20-02 printing services for the Treasurer's and Assessor's Office with Master's Touch, LLC. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. MOTION CARRIED

**G.)** MANAGER/HR: Motion to approve the purchase of Applicant Tracking and New Hire Onboarding System.

<u>Kristin Oliver</u> is asking for the approval from the Commission to purchase and applicant tracking and new hire onboarding system. This system will allow applicants the ability to apply online as well as complete their orientation. This systems will insure that we are in compliance with the application process, help us to source and screen for qualified candidates, streamline, and modernize paper based work flow, and help us with record retention requirements without having to store 100's of applications.

Ms. Oliver states that the main reason this system would be good for the county is that it will get us better outreach and bring in more candidates. The county currently receives 0-5 applications for departments in the county. It is proven that counties that switch to online application increase their applications by 300%. This will also save time by allowing the applicants to do their orientation and training online. The county has lost out on qualified candidates because we only take paper applications.

In using this new system, it will allow the county to post any new jobs on carious hiring sites and social media sites and those we currently use. Ms. Oliver stated that she talked to each of the department heads about using this systems and they stated that this is a great idea and would help the departments out. The main departments that would benefit would be the road department, dispatch, and sheriff. These are the departments that receive the most applications and have the highest turnover.

<u>Marty Rivera</u> states that this would help his department get better more qualified applicants. The department gets about 6 applicants to test, but out of the 6 only 1 will qualify.

<u>Christie Humphrey</u> states that Jesse Lucero, Torrance County Assessor, wanted her to speak in support of this system. The department gets very little applicants, with this system it will hopefully get us a larger pool with more qualified applicants.

<u>Kristin Oliver</u> states that she has done a lot of research on this program. She did get 3 quotes and would like to go with CivicHr. They are half the price of the other 2 companies. This company works specifically with government entities so they are aware of our needs.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> asks if the county will be held liable in any way for personal information on the applications. Chairman Schwebach also asks if Ms. Oliver has spoken with other entities or counties that have used this system.

<u>Kristin Oliver</u> states that the system is very secure. There is an area in the proposal that goes into detail with the security. In the event that we cancel the contract with them, they will return to us all the documentation they have. Ms. Oliver states that she reached out to the HR affiliate, but not of them have used this system. The feedback that she did get back was that those that do use the online application process have gotten a lot more qualified applicants.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> states that this program is expensive and is curious if they offer a trial basis. He reads that the first year is \$11,000.00

Kristin Oliver replies, the contract is yearly, so if we try it the first year and decide it's not working for us we can cancel the contract. Ms. Oliver states that she was able to get them to come down on the fee. The implementation costs would be \$10,750.00 for the first year. The yearly there after would be \$5,600.00. The other companies were over \$10,000.00 yearly.

Commissioner McCall asks how many applications the county received last year.

Kristin Oliver replies, 45.

Chairman Schwebach asks how many of those are out in the field.

**Kristin Oliver** replies, 10. That amount is average, and it's low because the sheriff's department is almost fully staffed. The road department has 3 open positions and dispatch has 4 open positions. This new system will screen the applicants and will send those that are qualified to the department.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> asks who is screening the applications now.

Kristin Oliver states that there is an officer that is doing the background checks now.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> states that this company will help potentially put an officer back on the streets, is that correct?

Marty Rivera states that the department has two officers that are qualified to do background checks. This will allow the officer to be back on patrol.

<u>Commissioner Sanchez</u> asks where this money will be budgeted from.

Kristin Oliver states that it will come out of capital outlay or the general fund.

Wayne Johnson asks if the Sheriff's department would still do the final background check on any new hires.

<u>Kristin Oliver</u> states that they would still have to go through the NCIC process, so yes the sheriff's department would still be involved,

<u>Christine Snow</u> states that the Sheriff's department does the initial background check. Once they are officially hired they go and get their fingerprints done, dispatch receives them back, and they will run them through NCIC. John Stocum does an extensive background check and makes sure that when they are hired we aren't firing them a week later because something came up.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> ask how we are currently advertising for jobs. He also states that he has noticed the county has had issues with hiring since he has been here.

<u>Kristin Oliver</u> states that we advertise in the Independent, KXNM radio station, it's posted on the county website, and also with the association of counties. Ms. Oliver states that most job boards cost about \$600.00 to post. This company includes a job board.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve the purchase of Applicant Tracking and New Hire Onboarding System. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. <u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that he will need the Chairman Schwebach to modify the motion to allow himself to sign on behalf of the county. <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> will amend his motion and make a motion to approve the purchase of Applicant Tracking and New Hire Onboarding System and allow County Manager Johnson to sign on behalf of the county.

<u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. **MOTION CARRIED** 

H.) DISPATCH: Motion to approve Dispatch re-organization removing an existing part-time position and using the budget proceeds to fund staff raises.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that he is encouraging all of the department heads to look within their budgets and find ways to better utilize that budget. We have done this in the past with the Assessor's Office.

Kristin Oliver states that all departments are underpaid and dispatch is one of those departments. We have researched other dispatch salaries in the state and the closest dispatch can get to is \$14.00 p/h. They currently start off at \$12.75 p/h. Dispatch has a part time position that is rarely ever filled. By doing away with this position they will be able to give their employees a 3% raise and raise the starting pay to \$13.00 p/h.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that this is simpler and more straight forward than what they did with the assessor's office. This could be implemented by the next pay period. This is money that has already been budgeted and approved by the Commission. This is within Dispatch's budget the money is being distributed to the other employees. It is hard to find someone that just wants to be a part time dispatcher. He and the staff are in full support of this.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve Dispatch reorganization removing an existing part-time position and using the budget proceeds to fund staff raises. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. MOTION CARRIED

I.) SHERIFF: Motion to approve purchases exceeding on Kaufman's and Pro-Vision invoices

<u>Stephanie Dunlap</u> states that she is here to ask for approval on invoices that were done the previous fiscal year. There was a miscommunication between the sheriff's department and finance. This has been rectified and is requesting payment of these invoices from the Commission. Ms. Dunlap states that there are 4 invoices from Kaufman's that need to be paid.

<u>Jeremy Oliver</u> states that the first invoice is from Kaufman's that was done in December. The sheriff's department did turn in a request for payment. It did get held up and he cannot find the information on the communication. The PO went over the amount of \$2499, which according to the policy, required 3 quotes. That is why it was held up and miscommunicated. The department is asking for approval to waive the need for the 3 quotes so that this invoice can get paid.

The second was a closed out PO. The PO was closed when it maxed out and there was no request made to increase the PO amount. This PO did not go over the \$2,499.00 amount. This PO closed out so there was a purchase made without a PO.

The third Kaufman's PO again had nothing turned in. The invoice was made in May and the PO was closed in June. The amount was about \$2,300.00, which exceeded the PO amount but

did not exceed the \$2,400.00 amount that requires 3 quotes. The purchase here was made through a closed PO.

The 4th PO did not exceed any amounts it was a purchase that was made on a closed out PO.

The 5<sup>th</sup> PO is from Pro-Vision. There was a PO in place for \$2,390.00, the total for the purchase was \$2,792.00. After peaking with a representative from Pro-Vision the reason for the overage was for shipping costs. This did go over the amount of \$2,499.00 and would have needed to have 3 quotes.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> states that as he understands all these invoices are for services rendered, the contractors have delivered the products, the county hasn't delivered, therefore these are before the Commission for proper procurement procedure, is that correct?

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> replies, yes, that is correct. Some of these are communication as well as procedural issues. They are working on simplifying the procedure. There have been changes made and some of these invoices came up as a result of the changes. The sheriff's department makes a lot of purchases and it's a lot of work on both that department as well as finance and they have to be able to work closely and communicate. We are in the process of going through an electronic Purchase Order request systems and this should help to eliminate some of the paper flow problem.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> states that he is under the impression that these a little glitches that are slowly getting fixed so that this type of issue doesn't happen again, correct?

<u>Stephanie Dunlap</u> replies, yes, that is correct. She also states that they are getting away from using Kaufman's as their uniform supplier. The department has found a company that will better suit their needs.

Chairman Schwebach asks if this is within their approved budget.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that this is within their approved budget. These invoices will have to be paid from this current budget because the budget from last year has been closed out. This will reduce the amount of money they have now to be able to purchase items that they need. This payment should clear up any issues, and not need to come back before the Commission for additional funding. This action here is not asking for additional funding.

<u>John Butrick</u> asks about item #1, invoice 2159S, on page 5 of the packet the Torrance County correction to existing PO, and has a dollar amount of \$216.27. Is that the amount that was left in the PO at that time?

**Stephanie Dunlap** replies, yes, that is correct. We are requesting an additional amount of \$812.49 to pay that PO.

<u>Jeremy Oliver</u> states that the original PO amount was for \$2,200.00. When the bill was paid there was only \$216.27 left on the PO and the PO needs to be raised to \$3,012.49.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> makes a motion to approve purchases exceeding on Kaufman's and Pro-Vision invoices. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. MOTION CARRIED

J.) SHERIFF: Motion to approve creation of shift differential pay for deputies performing Special Investigations

<u>Marty Rivera</u> states that they spoke about this item and decided to put this as an incentive pay and not a differential pay. Special Investigations is not a full time position. This pay will only be used when the officer is being used in a detective capacity. This pay is not just for one individual, it will be used for any officer being trained, or that is handling the investigation.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that it came to their attention that incentive pay is something that the Commission can grant at this point. The sheriff's department has money in their budget. They have \$3,000.00 available in their budget that is labeled as SID, but because it does not have a specific label it can be used in another area. They want to move this into an incentive pay class. In doing this as in incentive pay we would not have to make changes to the ordinance.

<u>Marty Rivera</u> states that this would include the code on the time clock that the officer will use while doing the investigation.

<u>Commissioner McCall</u> asks if this money has been budgeted every year and up until now, were they not able to utilize it?

<u>Stephanie Dunlap</u> states that the money has been budgeted every year but the previous sheriff did not allow them to use the money for what it was for. When Sheriff Rivera took office he knew what he wanted to do with the money so they have been working on this.

<u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that what they have done in the past is use these funds for line item transfers. The department does realize that this money will no longer be available for that as it will be moved to an incentive pay class.

Commissioner McCall states that this money will stay within staffing and payroll, correct?

Stephanie Dunlap replies, yes, that is correct.

<u>Chairman Schwebach</u> asks Sheriff Rivera if these items are budgeted within the current budget and if they will help his staff?

<u>Marty Rivera</u> replies, yes, this will be a big help. There are times that the investigator is not always available, so if we have other people trained, it will help the detective be where he needs to be.

ACTION TAKEN: <u>Commissioner McCall</u> makes a motion to approve creation of shift differential pay for deputies performing Special Investigations. <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> seconds the motion. <u>Wayne Johnson</u> states that the motion needs to be clear that this is for incentive pay and not differential pay as listed on the agenda. <u>Commissioner McCall</u> makes a

motion to amend his previous motion and make a motion to approve creation of shift incentive pay for deputies performing Special Investigations. <u>Chairman Schwebach</u> seconds the motion. No further discussion, all Commissioners in favor. **MOTION CARRIED**

#### **GRANT AGREEMENT**

This Grant Agreement (**Agreement**) is between the New Mexico Department of Transportation (**Department**) and County of Torrance (**Grantee**), collectively referred to as "the Parties." This Agreement is effective as of the date of the last party to sign it on the signature page below. The Department and the Grantee agree as follows:

- 1. Award. The Department hereby awards the Grantee funding for the following projects:
  - (a) End Driving While Impaired (ENDWI), Project No. 20-AL-64-103, \$2,016.00;
  - (b) Buckle Up (BKLUP)/Click It or Ticket (CIOT), Project No. 20-OP-RF-103, \$2,800.00;
  - (c) Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP)/100 Days and Nights of Summer (DNOS), Project No. 20-PT-RF-103, \$2,800.00;
  - (d) Total Funding awarded per this Agreement \$7,616.00.
- **Scope of Work.** The Grantee shall perform the professional services stated in the following exhibits: **Exhibit A** ENDWI; **Exhibit B** BKLUP/CIOT; **Exhibit C** STEP/DNOS.
- 3. Payment. To be reimbursed for eligible expenses, the Grantee must submit timely, properly prepared reimbursement requests as provided in the Department's Electronic Grant Management System or the Traffic Safety Division Financial Management Manual 2019, as directed by the Department. The Grantee acknowledges that the Department will not pay for any expenses incurred prior to both Parties signing the Agreement, after termination of the Agreement, or in excess of the amount of the award noted in Section 1. The Grantee must submit its final reimbursement request no later than thirty (30) days after termination of this Agreement, unless otherwise approved by the Department.
- 4. Records and Audit. The Grantee shall strictly account for all receipts and disbursements related to this Agreement. The Grantee shall record costs incurred, services rendered and payment received, and shall maintain these financial records during the term of this Agreement and for three (3) years from the date of submission of the final reimbursement request. On request, the Grantee shall provide the financial records to the Department and the state auditor, and shall allow the Department and the state auditor to inspect or audit these financial records during business hours at the Grantee's principal office during the term of this Agreement and for three (3) years from the date of submission of the final reimbursement request. If the financial records provided by the Grantee are insufficient to support an audit by customary accounting practices, the Grantee shall reimburse the Department for any expense incurred related to the insufficient documentation within thirty (30) days of written notice from the Department. If an audit or inspection reveals that funds were used for expenses not directly related to the project, or otherwise used inappropriately, or that payments were excessive or otherwise erroneous, the Grantee shall reimburse the Department for those funds or payments within thirty days of written notice.

- 5. Officials Not to Benefit. The Parties intend that no member of the New Mexico legislature or the United States Congress, or any public official, public employee or tribal council member, in that person's individual capacity, will benefit from this Agreement.
- Grantee thirty (30) days written notice. On receipt of a "Notice of Cancellation," the Grantee shall suspend work unless otherwise directed by the Department in writing. The Grantee may only terminate this Agreement based on the Department's uncured, material breach of the Agreement and by giving by giving the Department thirty (30) days' written notice. The Parties acknowledge that termination will not nullify obligations incurred prior to termination.
- **7. Appropriations.** The Grantee acknowledges that:
  - (a) this Agreement is contingent upon sufficient appropriations and authorizations being made by the Congress of the United States or the New Mexico state legislature:
  - (b) if sufficient appropriations and authorizations are not made, this Agreement will terminate upon written notice by the Department to the Grantee; and
  - (c) the Department will not expend any funds until they are approved for expenditure, and the Department's determination as to whether approval has been granted will be final.
- **8. Compliance with Law.** The Grantee, its employees, agents and contractors, shall comply with the following:
  - (a) Title VI and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, the ADA Amendments Act of 2008, the Environmental Justice Act of 1994, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, and 49 C.F.R. Section 21;
  - (b) all federal and state laws, rules, and regulations, and executive orders of the Governor of the state of New Mexico pertaining to equal employment opportunity, including the Human Rights Act, NMSA 1978, Sections 28-1-1 through 28-1-15 (and in accordance with such, the Grantee states that no person, on the grounds of race, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, spousal affiliation, serious medical condition, age, disability, or other protected class will be excluded from employment with or participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise subjected to, discrimination in any activity performed under this Agreement; if the Grantee it is found to be in violation of any of these requirements, the Grantee shall take prompt and appropriate steps to correct such violation);
  - (c) state laws applicable to workers compensation benefits for the Grantee's employees, including the Workers' Compensation Act, NMSA 1978, Sections 52-1-1 through 52-1-70, and related regulations;
  - (d) 2 C.F.R. 200, Subpart F Audit Requirements, Sections 200.500 200.521; and
  - (e) those sections in **Exhibit D** labeled "applies to subrecipients as well as states."
- 9. Notices. For a notice under this Agreement to be valid, it must be in writing; be delivered by hand, registered or certified mail return receipt requested and postage prepaid, fax or email; and be addressed as follows:

- **10. Severability.** The terms of this Agreement are lawful; performance of all duties and obligations shall confirm with and do not contravene any state, local, or federal statute, regulation, rule, or ordinance. The Parties intend that if any provision of this Agreement is held to be unenforceable, the rest of the Agreement will remain in effect as written.
- 11. Tort Claims. Neither party shall be responsible for liability incurred as a result of the other party's acts or omissions in connection with this Agreement. Any liability incurred in connection with the Agreement is subject to the immunities and limitations of the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, NMSA 1978, Sections 41-4-1, et seq., as amended. This paragraph is intended only to define the liabilities between the Parties and it is not intended to modify in any way, the Parties' liabilities as governed by common law or the New Mexico Tort Claims Act.
- 12. Jurisdiction and Venue. The Grantee acknowledges the jurisdiction of the courts of the state of New Mexico for any adversarial proceeding arising out of this Agreement, and that venue for any such proceeding will be in the First Judicial District Court for the county of Santa Fe, New Mexico.
- **13. Project Responsibility.** The Grantee acknowledges that it bears sole responsibility for performing the services referred to in Section 2.
- 14. Term. This Agreement takes effect upon signature of all Parties. If the Grantee does not deliver the signed Agreement to the Department within sixty (60) days of the Department's signature, the Agreement will be voidable by the Department. The Agreement terminates at 12:00 a.m. on September 30, 2020, unless earlier terminated as provided in Section 6 or Section 7.
- **15. Applicable Law.** The laws of the state of New Mexico, without giving effect to its choice of law principles, govern all adversarial proceedings arising out of this Agreement.
- **16. Amendment.** No amendment of this Agreement will be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the Parties.
- 17. No Third-party Beneficiary. This Agreement does not confer any rights or remedies on anyone other than the Department and the Grantee.
- 18. Scope of Agreement and Merger. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the Parties with respect to the subject matter of the Agreement and supersedes all other Agreements, whether written or oral, between the Parties, except that this Agreement does not supersede the Grantee's rights under any other grant agreement.

19. Disadvantaged Business Enterprise. The following provision applies to a USDOT-assisted federally funded Agreement only. The recipient shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, or other protected class in the award and performance of any USDOT-assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE program or the requirements of 49 CFR Part 26. The recipient shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR Part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of USDOT-assisted contracts. The recipient's DBE program, as required by 49 CFR Part 26 and as approved by USDOT, is incorporated by reference in this Agreement. Implementation of this program is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as a violation of this Agreement. Upon notification to the recipient of its failure to carry out its approved program, the Department may impose sanctions as provided for under Part 26 and may, in appropriate cases, refer the matter for enforcement under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31 U.S.C. 3801 et seq.).

#### Exhibit A: Scope of Work, Training, Reimbursement and Reporting

#### END DRIVING WHILE IMPAIRED (ENDWI) Project Number: 20-AL-64-103

- 1. Scope of Work. The Grantee shall conduct DWI directed enforcement patrols (DDEPs) as negotiated between the Department and the Grantee, in high crash locations identified in data compiled by local, state or federal government agencies and included the Grantee's Operational Plan. The Department encourages the Grantee to accompany DDEPs with public information, media and educational activities DDEPs must deploy officers in high crash locations consistent with the enforcement plan. If for any reason the DDEPs were conducted in areas not consistent with the enforcement plan, the Grantee must submit a justification with the invoice for these services. The Department may choose to deny the invoice for DDEPs based on the justification. The Grantee is encourage to schedule DDEPs throughout the grant period with a focus on participating during the Superblitz Period, 3 Mini Superblitz Periods, and National DWI Mobilizations as identified below.
- **2. Definitions.** For purposes of this exhibit, the following definitions apply:

"Agency Coordinator" means the person assigned by the Grantee to assume direct responsibility for administering all phases of the Agreement.

"Directed Enforcement Patrols" means activities that enforce traffic laws in areas consistent with the agency's operational plan.

"Operational Plan" means a plan based on the most current crash data that identifies the problem to be addressed, goals to be achieved, and the performance measures to be employed. The Grantee may update its operational plan as needed to align with current trends.

"Winter Superblitz Period" means November 8, 2019 to January 4, 2020.

"St. Patrick's Day Mini Superblitz Period" means March 13 to March 21, 2020.

"Cinco de Mayo May Mini Superblitz Period" means May 1 to May 7, 2020.

"Fourth of July Mini Superblitz Period" means July 1 to July 8, 2020.

"National DWI Mobilization Period" means August 21 to September 7, 2020.

Training and Qualifications. The Agency Coordinator must attend the Department's Law Enforcement Coordinators symposium and other Department training as required. The Grantee should notify the Department of any changes in the Agency Coordinator as soon as possible. The Grantee's participating officers must have law enforcement certifications in all areas necessary to conduct the services noted in Section 1 of this exhibit. The Grantee shall keep documentation of training and provide the Department with a list of certified officers on request.

- 4. Reimbursement. The Department will pay the Grantee for the actual cost paid to personnel that worked the DDEPs. #### **NEEDS STATEMENT**

Provide a concise and clear description of the problems and community needs your Continuum is addressing (e.g., alternatives to detention), using your community's needs assessment, system assessment (for Continuums in Judicial Districts 6 & 13), the provided county statistics, and the JJAC Strategic Plan.

Torrance County consists of a large area, few residents, and a declining economy. It is the nineteenth largest county in New Mexico covering 3,346 square miles The estimated 2018 population equals 15,591, or 4.9 people per square mile, making the County a rural area. The population of 10-17 year olds is 1,612 and has 1.4% of New Mexico's juvenile justice term facility admissions. The median household income of \$35,543 is less than 80% of the median household income in New Mexico. Persons in poverty equals 26.7% of the population. These statistics indicate Torrance County youth may be at risk.

Data supplied by CYFD reports the estimated population of 10-17 year olds remains stable at 0.8% of the population. Delinquent referrals of youth in the County equal 73 in 2018 (57 male, 16 female). Female referrals are down by 4 as compared to 2017 data and remains steady for males. Hispanic youth dominate the number of delinquent referrals with 44 Hispanics, 23 non-Hispanic, 3 African American, 1 Asian, 1 two or more races, and 1 unknown race/ethnicity. A marked change of referrals is shown within the 14-15 age range where referrals have increase by 11 from 19 in 2017 to 30 in 2018. Torrance County's Juvenile Justice Board, the Estancia Valley Youth and Family Council (EVYFC), has identified three objectives during their update of their work plan initiated in August 2019: 1) increase resiliency factors among youth and families; 2) reduce truancy and out-of-school suspensions; and 3) increase collaboration between schools, service providers, and EVYFC. These objectives were identified following examination of local datasets during a retreat held in 2018. Two of the datasets indicate the County youth are facing problems with mental health and substance abuse. JIFF assessments completed in FY2018 revealed 47% of the youths reported feelings of depression, 31% reported self-harm potential, and 23% reported feelings of anxlety. A second data set was compiled from 1,239 Strategies for Success surveys from 549 middle school students and 690 high school students. The results substantiate that County youth are struggling with mental health with 38% of middle school and high school respondents reporting they felt sad or hopeless every day for at least two weeks and had seriously considered suicide in the last year. Students reporting they had made a suicide attempt in the last year totaled 16.8% of the middle school and 13.6% of the high school respondents. The survey also indicates problems with substance abuse. Usage of alcohol, marijuana, and e-cigarettes was reported by 10.3 - 15.2% of the middle school students, and 24.7-38.9% of the high school students. In 2018, delinquent referrals in the County totaled 113. Of these, 31.36% were for drug or alcohol related activity. On a positive note, more than half the JIFF assessments showed the youths desired to improve behavior and performance at school. A desire to decrease drug and alcohol usage was also reported. The EVYFC concluded that Improving the resiliency of the County youth could address mental health and substance abuse issues. Addressing these risks should then increase attendance, participation, and graduation. Boys Council and Girls Circle programs were identified as the means to address these risks. Implementation of these programs will require increased collaboration between the EVYFC and the schools, which will be completed by outreach from the Juvenile Justice Continuum Coordinator as well as the EVYFC.

One Circle Foundation programs align with the objectives defined in the strategic plan of Torrance County's CAB, the Estancia Valley Youth and Family Council (EVYFC). The first two objectives include 1) increase resiliency factors among youth and families, and 2) reduce truancy and out-of-school suspensions. Girls Circle integrates relational theory, resiliency practices, and skills training to increase positive connection, strengths, and competence. Boys Council provides strong, positive relationships that give boys an opportunity to address masculine definitions and behaviors and find their value. Partnerships achieve these goals, which realizes the third objective of the EVYFC: increase collaboration between schools, service providers, and EVYFC. The Juvenile Justice Continuum Coordinator will reach out to community partners to build the programs which are operational in the Estancia Middle School. The Coordinator will continue efforts to expand the programs into two other school districts and make them a part of Teen Court sentencing. Data shows a marked change of delinquent referrals within the 14-15 age range where referrals increased by 11 from 19 in 2017 to 30 in 2018. This indicates placement in the middle schools has the potential to reach youths as they approach this critical age. The programs assess a youth for risks and tailors a plan to meet individual needs; however, the group setting fosters positive interactions. The curriculum addresses risk factors. The groups focus on different themes with discussion and activities. Girls Circle topics include body image, honoring diversity, substance usage/abuse, expressing individuality, peer and family relationships, goal setting, and bullying. Boys Council themes include rejecting violence, valuing diversity, safe expression of emotions, mentoring, and value definition. When necessary, facilitators refer youths to counselors. Tutoring is offered to increase school participation. Youths are given hands-on life-skills opportunities such as job preparedness, gardening, and managing difficult emotions.

The One Circle programs address the five priority areas. They guide youth to prevent them from entering the juvenile justice system. As part of teen court sentencing, they are an alternative to detention. Assessments are performed to identify and appropriately meet individual needs. They promote positive behaviors and reduce racial/ethnic disparities. They meet gender-specific needs. Ongoing funding will allow the EVYFC to strengthen these programs and our youth.

Boys Council is a gender specific program to help young men aged 9-18 develop healthy and diverse masculine identities which allow them to grow as respectful leaders. It is a strengths-based group approach that fosters positive relationships, addresses masculinity definitions and behaviors, and builds leadership capacities individually and collectively. Some of the topics discussed are valuing diversity, influences of mentors, making safe and healthy decisions, safe expression of emotions, and competition. Boys Council has been shown to increase school engagement, educational goals, the ability to avoid fighting, ethnic pride along with tolerance for diversity, and conflict resolution. It has also been shown to decrease aggression and feelings that men should not show their feelings or ask for help.  Torrance County has adapted Boys Council and Girls Circle to fit within a classroom approach as allowed by One Circle Foundation. Estancia Middle School has committed 4 class periods each to two facilitators every Friday for the entire school year. Four class periods are for Boys Council, which is led by a man, as recommended by One Circle Foundation. Boys Council and Girls Circle briefly meet together to take role call. After roll call, the boys with their facilitator move to an adjacent classroom to hold Boys Council. At the outset of the FY 2019-2020 school year, 46 boys were enrolled in Boys Council.  Torrance County's Juvenile Justice Board, the Estancia Valley Youth and Family Council (EVYFC), is working to extend Boys Council and Girls Circle into the Mountainair and Moriarty-Edgewood schools. The Girls Circle facilitator at the Estancia Middle School would also like to make Girls Circle and Boys Council programs available to high school students as well.

## REGULAR MEETING October 2, 2019

## **ATTENDANCE**

In attendance were: Acting Chairman Jim Frost, Board members Gail Langell, Catherine Lynch and Alternate Board member Art DuCharme. County Attorney John Butrick, Planning & Zoning Director Steve Guetschow, and Planning & Zoning Clerical Assistant Don Goen, Mr. Wayne Canon, guest consultant from the Office of the State Engineer.

## CALL TO ORDER

Acting Chairman Frost called the meeting to order at 9:34 a.m.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

## APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Acting Chairman Frost presented the meeting agenda and asked for a motion. Mrs. Lynch made a motion to approve. Mrs. Langell seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.

## APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Acting Chairman Frost presented the minutes of the September 4, 2019 Planning & Zoning Board Meeting and asked for a motion. Mrs. Lynch made a motion to approve. Mrs. Langell seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.

## **Action Items:**

1. Partial Vacation of Plat & Vacation of Right of Way

Applicant: Andrew Miller Agent: Blair Dunn

Site: Lots 6 through 15, 22, 23, 26, 27 Antelope Springs Subdivision

Zone: PL 1 Pre-Platted Lands District

Mr. Frost introduced the item. Mr. Blair Dunn came forward and was sworn. He explained the application and that it was straight forward. The application had been submitted in an effort of good faith based on discussions with Mr. Guetschow in an effort to come in to compliance. He understood public notice had been posted in accordance with regulations. He explained that everything was in order and that this was the path for the applicant to continue agricultural operations at the site. Mr. Frost asked for comments in favor of the item. Mr. Guetschow explained the meeting format to the public. There were no comments in favor of the item and Mr. Guetschow asked for comments in opposition to the item. Mrs. Susan Wyerich came forward and was sworn. She explained that they didn't understand the application and that there had been no communication with the applicant. They felt they should have been approached by the applicant for their opinion on his intentions at the site. She had concerns that if the application was approved how they might be affected in regards to property taxes, etc. Mr. Frost asked if there was further comment in opposition to the item.

Mrs. Lucy Lawrence came forward and was sworn. She explained that she and other family members had owned property along Bart Ln for over 20 years. She asked what kind of agriculture was going to take place. She had concerns about the applicant's water rights, the effect on other wells in the area and property taxes. She had a concern about increased traffic in the area. There was no further comment in opposition. Mr. Frost asked Staff for comment. Mr. Guetschow explained that the subject lots were at the edge of the Antelope Springs subdivision on the South end of Bart Lane. He explained that this was a type 2 subdivision and the regulations that had determined it was a type 2 subdivision. Under Section 11.C.5 of the Zoning Ordinance commercial agricultural operations were prohibited within type 1 and type 2 subdivisions. For the applicant to pursue his desired agricultural operations he would have to vacate that portion of the subdivision. Bart Lane was a little used right of way, the southern end of which bisected the subject properties and would be vacated. In addition on the East side of the property was an unnamed 30 foot right of way that was over grown which would also be vacated. This action would remove the subject property from the PL1 Zone subject to Rural Residential regulations and return it to Agricultural Preservation 5 Acre minimum (AP-5) sectionalized property. If approved by the Commission a new deed would need to be recorded by the applicant with a legal description that made no mention of the [current] lots or subdivision. Mr. Guetschow referenced the map which showed the portion of Bart Lane to be vacated from between lots 8 and 23, south to Roland Lane, a 50 foot right of way; and the un-named 30 foot right of way along the east side of lots 6, 7, 10, 11, and 16. He offered copies of the map to the public. This vacation would not affect the northern part of Bart Lane just south of Willow Lake nor would it affect Roland Avenue to the south of the subject property. He explained that the Board's activity today would be to make a recommendation. The item would then come before the County Commissioners in a public hearing on October 23, 2019. Public notice would appear in the newspaper on Friday October 5, 2019. Mr. Butrick explained to Acting Chairman Mr. Frost that as staff has had the opportunity to introduce the item, the applicant has the opportunity to state their position, and the for and against have had the opportunity to state their concerns. At this point in the meeting format limited questions and/or discussion may be allowed from the floor. If there was no discussion or questions from the floor the applicant would then have the opportunity to rebut any questions or concerns from those in opposition. Once done the item would be brought to the table for Board question or comment. Mr. Frost asked if there were any further questions from the floor. Mrs. Lawrence returned to the podium. She explained that Roland Lane and Bart Lane was directly in front of their property and wanted to see on the map where the right of way vacation was. She was opposed to the traffic pattern that might take place. Mr. Guetschow explained that Kathy Lane and Bart Lane were public rights of way. He showed Mrs. Lawrence on the map the property access that would remain after the partial vacation of Bart Lane and that access to properties owned by other than Mr. Miller would not be affected. Mrs. Lawrence requested a copy of the map and stated that she would contact her attorney. Mr. Guetschow referenced the application and the map showing the lots owned by the applicant and those that were to be vacated. He then clarified what vacating meant. Mrs. Lawrence then asked what type of agriculture did the applicant intend to do. Mrs. Wyerich returned to the podium and explained that the applicant was currently growing hemp. Her concern was safety for her horses and home with proximity to the hemp and that they shot guns day and night. Mr. Mark Lawrence came forward and was sworn. He inquired about public notice for the Board of County Commissioners meeting. Mr. Guetschow explained the public notice procedure relating to public hearings, ie: signage, letters to adjoining property owners, and public notice ads in the local newspaper. Mr. Butrick added that the agenda for the meeting would be posted on the County website and at the

entry doors to the Administration Building. There being no more comment **Mr. Dunn** returned to the podium for rebuttal. He appreciated the concerns of the neighbors but states Mr. Miller is going through this process to remove the subdivision restrictions from his land to conform with the way he wishes to use his private property; it isn't interfering with any other property. In regard to effects on property taxes his use of the property should not affect properties other than his own. As to concerns of use of the property in an agricultural fashion, his clients will be in full compliance with all the regulations in regard to agricultural use and County regulations. **Mrs. Langell** asked if Bart lane stops at the Miller property or goes further south. Mr. Dunn deferred to Staff and Mr. Guetschow displayed the subdivision plat to the Board and explained the correlation of the roadways to the subject properties.

Mr. Frost referred the matter to the Board for questions or comments. He asked Mr. Butrick for confirmation of what type of action the Board could make. Mr. Butrick explains the Board would make a recommendation whether for approval or disapproval that will be provided to the County Commission for their review. Mr. Frost through Mr. Butrick confirms the final decision lies with the County Commission. Mr. Guetschow reminded the Board of what constitutes a PL zone district and the County's wishes regarding the dissolution of these subdivisions/zone districts through zone change or vacation. Mr. Frost inquired about the acreage involved and water use approval. Mr. Guetschow explained the approximate total of 70 acres involved and then invited Mr. Canon from the Office of the State Engineer to the podium to answer general questions on water use/water rights approvals. Mr. Canon explained when a person changes a well allocation or a farm changes ownership the owner must bring their deed to the OSE and update the existing well permit records. The quantity of water diversion [in this case] is yet to be determined but when they bring their documentation in the OSE will determine the limits of diversion from the well or wells the applicant may be using. Mr. Frost asked if the County Commission or P&Z has a say so on use of water. Mr. Canon deferred to Staff who referenced section 23 of the zoning ordinance for water usage and reiterated Mr. Canon's remarks about the well & diversion being reviewed by the OSE for change of ownership or use. Mrs. Langell asked if Mr. Canon had knowledge of the subject wells being pumped but was reminded that Mr. Canon was not in attendance to discuss specific issues on an action; just general questions in regard to regulatory matters. Mr. Dunn responded that his clients did have an irrigation water right attached to the property. Mrs. Lynch asked what type of agriculture would be allowed if the property is vacated from the subdivision. Staff replied that any type of commercial agriculture would be permissive. She and Staff discussed various aspects of commercial agriculture how, although hemp farming is licensed and monitored by the State, it's still an agricultural product. Mr. Canon interjected that the OSE doesn't discriminate on beneficial uses as it was not in their jurisdiction to do so. Mrs. Lynch wanted to address the concern expressed about what kind of enterprise would be operated once the property reverted back to agriculture. Mr. Ducharme asked if the vacation was approved would the applicant have to come back for a change of zoning or if the zone change was an automatic reversion. Mr. Guetschow confirmed the zone change would be automatic upon approval of the vacation action and explained the recordation process and future use of the information in land division matters. Mr. Ducharme asked if we knew hemp farming was happening on the property which Mr. Dunn addressed confirming the crop. Mr. Butrick asked if the use would be considered agricultural or horticultural. Staff responded it is agriculture and explained the nuances of agricultural and horticultural operations. Mrs. Lynch had concerns about the agricultural operation conducted in the subdivision and Staff confirmed it was and the action was the applicant's pathway to compliance. Mr. Frost asked if a Conditional Use Permit was required from the County and Staff explained once the zoning reverts to AP-5 zoning

farming is a permissive use. Hearing no more questions and on advice from counsel concerning the body of the motion, Mr. Frost asked for a motion. Mrs. Langell made a motion to pass the action onto the County Commission with our approval. Mr. Frost seconded the motion. Mrs. Langell and Mr. Frost voted in favor; Mrs. Lynch was opposed.

Mr. Frost asked for comment in favor or opposition to the action. Hearing none he asked Staff for comment. Mr. Guetschow explained the history of a Conditional Use for a second dwelling and a previously approved Variance for Area. Mr. Dominguez had completed the corrections requested and documentation required by the type of survey. Mr. Frost asked for questions from the Board; hearing none he asked for a motion. Mrs. Lynch motioned to approve, Mrs. Langell seconded; All in favor. Motion carried.

Hearing none he asked for Staff comment. Mr. Guetschow explained the rules for Lot Line Adjustment claims of exemption and the plat conformed to all County & State regulations. He further explained the benefit of an actual survey in the area in relation to existing road locations and easements. Mr. Frost asked for questions from the Board; hearing none he asked for a

motion. Mrs. Lynch moved to approve, Mrs. Langell seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.

### Section 7.3. Vacation of Plats

- 7.3.1. <u>Cause.</u> Any final plat filed in the office of the County Clerk may be vacated or a portion of the final plat may be vacated if:
  - a. the owners of the land proposed to be vacated sign an acknowledged statement declaring the final plat or a portion of the final plat to be vacated, and the statement is approved by the Board of County Commissioners; or
  - b. the Board of County Commissioners finds that a plat was obtained by misrepresentation or fraud and orders a statement of vacation to be prepared by the County.
- 7.3.2. Request for vacation. The vacation of all or a portion of a final plat shall be initiated by submittal of a request for vacation to the County Clerk, along with the names of all owners of record of property within the subdivided land to be vacated and the names of all owners of record of property contiguous to the subdivided land to be vacated. The request for vacation shall be considered filed upon payment of the required administrative fee. Copies of the request for vacation, including all supplemental information, shall be transmitted by the County Clerk within three (3) working days to the County Zoning Clerk who shall present such request to the Torrance County Planning and Zoning Commission for review and comment.

- 7.3.3. Scheduling and notification. Within sixty (60) days after the date of receipt of the request for vacation, the Board of County Commissioners shall approve or deny the vacation, subject to the following:
  - a. Action shall be taken at a public meeting;
  - b. The Torrance Planning and Zoning Commission shall be notified of the proposed vacation and allowed to comment;
  - c. At least fifteen (15) days before the proposed meeting, all owners of record of property within the subdivided land to be vacated and all owners of record of property contiguous to the subdivided land to be vacated shall have been notified by mail of the proposed vacation and the date, time and place of the public meeting at which the vacation will be considered by the Board of County Commissioners; and
  - d. Relevant utilities and other agencies have been notified.

- 7.3.4. Action. In approving or denying the vacation of all or a part of a final plat, the Board of County Commissioners shall decide whether or not the vacation will adversely affect the interests of persons on contiguous land or of persons within the subdivision being vacated. In approving the vacation of all or a portion of a final plat, the Board of County Commissioners may require that roads dedicated to the County in the final plat continue to be dedicated to the County. [REV: Ord. No. 2008-004. 4/23/08]
- 7.3.5. Filing. The approved statement declaring the vacation of a portion or all of a final plat shall be filed in the office of the County Clerk. The County Clerk shall mark the final plat with the words "Vacated" or "Partially Vacated" and refer on the final plat to the volume and page on which the statement of vacation is recorded.
- 7.3.6. <u>Utilities.</u> The rights of any utility existing before the total or partial vacation of any final plat are not affected by the vacation of a final plat.

### Section 7.4. Variances

- 7.4.1. Planned development area. The Torrance County Planning and Zoning Commission may grant a variance from the standards and requirements of these Regulations if it is presented with a plan and program for a new town, a complete community, or a neighborhood unit, which, in the judgment of the Torrance County Planning and Zoning Commission provides adequate public spaces and improvements for the circulation, recreation, light, air, and service needs of the tract when fully developed and populated, and which also provides such covenants and other legal provisions as will assure conformity to and achievement of the plan.
- 7.4.2. Conditions and limitations. A variance shall not be granted which will cause the County to absorb costs over and above those typically associated with subdivision approval. In granting variances, the Torrance County Planning and Zoning Commission may require such conditions as will:
  - a. substantially secure the objectives of the standards of these Regulations; and
  - b. not adversely affect the health, safety, and general welfare of the public, if otherwise consistent with the general purpose and intent of these Regulations and if not injurious or detrimental to the surrounding area.

STATE STATUTE

**Burden of proof to prove acceptance.** — The burden to prove acceptance by the city is met by proof which must be "clear, satisfactory and unequivocal." *Watson v. City of Albuquerque*, 1966-NMSC-142, 76 N.M. 566, 417 P.2d 54.

Acts by city insufficient to establish acceptance. — The fact that a city has, on an irregular basis, plowed or repaired a street does not, by itself, establish an acceptance by the city. Nor does the use of the right-of-way by the city for collection of garbage or installation of a street sign, or the giving of permission to a utility company to erect poles in the right-of-way under a general franchise or the omission by the city to assess the right-of-way for taxes, by themselves, establish an acceptance by the city. *Watson v. City of Albuquerque*, 1966-NMSC-142, 76 N.M. 566, 417 P.2d 54.

Effect of conditional language in dedication. — After dedication and acceptance, the land becomes the property of the municipality in fee simple, unless the dedication contains conditional language or a reservation in the grantor of a present or future interest. In other words, there is an absolute gift from the donors to the city unless there is conditional language in the dedication. *Wheeler v. Monroe*, 1974-NMSC-053, 86 N.M. 296, 523 P.2d 540, appeal dismissed, 419 U.S. 1014, 95 S. Ct. 487, 42 L. Ed. 2d 288.

**Modification by dedicator.** — A dedication once effectively made by the owner bound him and neither he nor his successors in title could thereafter impair it by filing an amended plat. *State ex rel. Shelton v. Board of Comm'rs*, 1945-NMSC-027, 49 N.M. 218, 161 P.2d 212.

**Parking area not dedicated.** — When a recorded plat designated a particular area as a "parking area," but failed to dedicate this area to the public use as per statute, there was no dedication of the parking area. *State ex rel. State Hwy. Comm'n v. Briggs*, 1963-NMSC-196, 73 N.M. 170, 386 P.2d 258.

# 3-20-12. Vacation or partial vacation of plat; approval of government having jurisdiction; duties of county clerk.

A. Any plat filed in the office of the county clerk may be vacated or a portion of the plat may be vacated provided:

(1) the owners of the land in the territory proposed to be vacated sign a statement, duly acknowledged, declaring the plat or a portion of the plat to be vacated; and

- (2) the statement is endorsed "Approved" by the planning authority of the municipality within whose platting jurisdiction the subdivision lies.
- B. In approving the vacation or partial vacation of a plat, the planning authority of the municipality shall consider if the vacation or partial vacation of a plat will adversely affect the interests or rights of persons in contiguous territory or within the subdivision being vacated. In approving the vacation or partial vacation of a plat, the planning authority of the municipality may require that streets dedicated to the municipality in the original plat shall continue to be dedicated to the municipality. The owners of lots on the vacated plat or on the portion of the plat being vacated may enclose in equal proportions the adjoining streets and alleys which are authorized to be abandoned by the planning authority of the municipality.
- C. The statement declaring the vacation or partial vacation of a plat and having the proper endorsements shall be filed in the office of the county clerk wherein the original plat is filed. The county clerk shall mark the applicable words "Vacated" or "Partially Vacated" across the plat and shall refer on the plat to the volume and page on which the statement of vacation or partial vacation is recorded.

### **ANNOTATIONS**

"Planning authority" synonymous with planning commission. — Where a city has created a planning commission pursuant to 3-19-1 NMSA 1978 and delegated to it the powers necessary to carry out the laws relating to planning and platting, the planning commission and not the city itself is the "planning authority" referred to in Subsection B and that commission must approve any statement declaring certain property to be vacated before the requirements of this section are met. Sprague v. City of Las Vegas, 1984-NMSC-052, 101 N.M. 185, 679 P.2d 1283.

Modification by dedicator. — A dedication once effectively made by the owner bound him and neither he nor his successors in title could thereafter impair it by filing an amended plat. Statute prescribed the only manner in which a dedication might be vacated. State ex rel. Shelton v. Board of Comm'rs, 1945-NMSC-027, 49 N.M. 218, 161 P.2d 212.
