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### **COVID-19 STATEMENT**

As valid consideration for entry into and/or participation in the Torrance County Livestock Show, attendees and participants and their family, heirs, next of kin, administrators, executors, assigns, and successors recognize, acknowledge, and understand there are risks associated with entry into and participation in the Torrance County Livestock Show and assume all risk and shall forever release, waive, discharge, covenant not to sue, defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Torrance County and the Torrance County Fair Board from any and all actions, causes of action, proceedings, claims, demands, costs, damages, attorneys' fees and all other liabilities and expenses of any kind from any source which may directly or indirectly arise out of any loss, loss of use, theft, property damage, privacy rights, disability, or injury, including death, accrued or to accrue in the future, known or unknown, that may be sustained as a result of or incidental to the attending and/or participating in the Torrance County Livestock Show, including, but not limited to, from traveling to and from on or about the Torrance County Fairgrounds and all risks of exposure to COVID-19 (Coronavirus) to attendees and participants, terrain, facilities, temperature, weather, condition of attendees and participants, equipment, vehicular traffic, lack of hydration, or actions of other people, without limitation, whatever the cause regardless of whether based on the strict liability, negligence, gross negligence, carelessness, failure to act, fault, producing cause, unintentional acts, or otherwise by Torrance County, the Torrance County Fair Board, or their managers, directors, officers, employees, volunteers, representatives, servants, agents, or sponsors.

All indemnifications agreed to shall be construed broadly to provide a release and waiver to Torrance County and the Torrance County Fair Board to the maximum extent permissible under applicable law.

Attendees and participants further acknowledge that Torrance County, the Torrance County Fair Board, and their managers, directors, officers, volunteers, representatives, and agents are NOT responsible for the errors, omissions, acts, or failures to act of any party or entity conducting a specific activity on Torrance County or the Torrance County Fair Board's behalf.

Attendees and or participants acknowledge and represent that they have read the foregoing, fully understand it, and agree to it voluntarily, freely, and without limitation, and that no representations, promises or statements made by Torrance County, the Torrance County Fair Board, or any agent, attorney, or other representative of Torrance County or the Torrance County Fair Board has influenced the attendee and/or participant to abide by this Agreement. Attendees and participants further acknowledge that they are sufficiently informed about the risks involved by attending and or participating in the County Livestock Show and agrees to be bound by the same.

Torrance County or the Torrance County Fair Board, at its sole option, may terminate, amend, modify, or change any and all County Livestock Show activities, events, or schedules shown in this Fair Book or other publication in whole or in part at any time because of an act of God, strike, war, civil disturbance, epidemic, pandemic (i.e. COVID-19/Coronavirus), court order, or other such similar event.

- 6. Animals shown in the junior departments cannot be shown in the Open Class.
- 7. TCB initials stand for Torrance County Bred, meaning the animal was bred in Torrance County.

### GENERAL RULES OF THE FAIR

- 1. The Torrance County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret the rules and regulations and arbitrate, settle, and determine all matters, questions, and differences in regard thereto or otherwise out of, or connected with the fair.
- 2. Any person who violates any of the following or special rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and will be subject to such penalties as the governing body may order.
- 3. All protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$50 (certified check or cash), which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Any protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Fair Board President within 2 hours after completion of said show. NO SHOW SHALL BE DELAYED OR DISRUPTED DUE TO A PROTEST. THIS APPLIES TO ALL DEPARTMENTS.
- 4. The Torrance County Fair Board will take every precaution for the safety of the visitors and exhibitors but assumes no liability for personal injury or for loss or damage to any property of the exhibitor, patron, or concessionaire due to theft, weather conditions, or other causes.
- 5. No dogs are allowed on the fairgrounds unless they are part of the fair's schedule as a demonstration or act, or if they are to assist a physically challenged participant or guest.
- 6. RV and Camper parking will be allowed within the fairgrounds. RV SPACE WILL BE LIMITED. Electricity is NOT provided and is the RV/camper owner's responsibility. AN ADULT MUST BE PRESENT FOR OVERNIGHT STAY. Unauthorized vehicles will be towed away at the owner's expense. ALL RV'S MUST BE PARKED ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF THE FAIRGROUNDS. FAIRGROUNDS WILL BE OPEN TO PARK RV'S ON MONDAY AUGUST 8, 2022.
- 7. All livestock trailers must be parked on the NORTHEAST CORNER OF THE RED BARN.

# 8. NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS. ANY EXHIBITOR POSSESSING ANY ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.

- 9. The exhibits must be the handiwork of the exhibitor where mechanical skill is required, the grower where agriculture exhibits are required, and the owner, feeder, and seller (when applicable) where livestock is entered. Exhibits may be sold during the fair, but not removed until Friday check-out time.
- 10. The exhibitors must be members of 4-H or FFA in Torrance County, IN GOOD STANDING, and residents of Torrance County and/or a Torrance County School District.
- 11. The Fair Board and/or Superintendents reserve the right to reject any undesirable exhibit and livestock entries.

- 12. Superintendents may combine or add a class if they feel the need is justified.
- 13. The judges will be instructed not to award ribbons unless the articles are deemed worthy of merit. If no competition exists, the judges may award 2nd, 3rd, etc.

#### 14. Check in entries:

- Livestock entries must be checked in on Tuesday between 7:00am and 12:00pm.
- Farm Mechanics exhibits must be checked in on Tuesday between 9:00am to 12:00pm.
- Indoor exhibits, including special cake, check in on Tuesday between 9:00am 7:00pm.
- All Floriculture exhibits must be checked in on Wednesday between 1:00pm and 5:00pm.
- 15. It is each exhibitor's responsibility to read and understand the rules specific to the area in which he or she is participating.

# Participants and guests of the fairgrounds agree to comply with COVID-19 safety requirements.

### TORRANCE COUNTY FAIR SPORTSMANSHIP

All attending the Torrance County Fair either as exhibitors, parents, spectators, superintendents, judges, or fair officials must conduct themselves in a manner consistent with the following Code of Show Ring Ethics. This code of conduct is not limited to the show ring, but is applicable to all departments, activities, and events associated with the Torrance County Fair. Consequences of violating this code of conduct may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Verbal Warning
- 2. Written Warning
- 3. Removal from Fairgrounds
- 4. Suspension, reduction and/or loss of premiums
- 5. Suspension, reduction and/or loss of auction proceeds
- 6. Loss of future show privileges
- 7. Notification to other local fairs as to disciplinary actions taken

### **CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS**

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves honestly, and ethically and display good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Foul language or disruptive behavior will not be tolerated and will constitute removal from grounds. Owners, parents, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and any responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows.

### JUNIOR DIVISION RULES

The general rules of the Torrance County Fair apply except as otherwise stated below. All exhibitors must be bonified 4-H Club members enrolled in the projects they are exhibiting or FFA members in the State of New Mexico for the 2021-2022 school year, certified by the County Agent or Agriculture Education Advisor. EXCEPTION: The Floriculture Division is open to any youth through 17 years of age living in Torrance County or attending school districts within the county. All entries must be certified as to eligibility by the County 4-H agent or FFA advisor. No individual entries without signature will be accepted. All animals must be owned, cared for, and entered in the name of the individual owner, except for the Dairy Goat Show. New residents must have eligibility certificates from former county 4-H agents or Vo-Ag teachers stating (1) they are a member in good standing, and (2) that the special length of time the member must own the animal has been complied with.

1. Animals must be checked in and will be weighed in as follows:

TUESDAY, AUGUST 9th, 2022

7:00am-10:00am Livestock Check-in for All Animals

10:00am Weigh-in

- 2. CLASSES WILL BE BROKEN IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING WEIGH IN.
  - Market Calves will be classified by weight method. Weight is 1,000 pounds minimum. No sale animal's weight will be listed above 1,300 pounds.
  - Market Lamb weights: (Southdown) 67-pound minimum weight (All Others) 81-pound minimum, no maximum weight
  - Market Hog weights: 181-pound minimum weight, 284-pound maximum weight
  - Market Goat weights: 33-pound minimum weight, no maximum weight
     RE-WEIGH RULES
  - Animals are allowed one re-weigh if that species does not make weight either over or under.
  - Re-weigh of pig, sheep and goats will begin 15 minutes after the last species is weighed
  - Re-weigh will be in exact same order as official weigh ins were done
  - Re-weigh will be called for one time only
  - Exhibitors' responsibility to request reweigh and bring animal to scale on time
  - ANY ATTEMPT TO MANIPULATE ANIMAL WEIGHT DEEMED CRUEL OR DECEPTIVE BY THE SUPERINTENDENT OR A QUORUM OF FAIR BOARD MEMBERS WILL DISQUALIFY AN EXHIBITOR.
- 3. NO LIVESTOCK ARE ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS PRIOR TO CHECK-IN.
- 4. Any junior livestock exhibitor with animals eligible for the Junior Livestock Sale who have shown or will show livestock in another County Livestock Show/4-H Livestock Show during 2021, will not be allowed to show at the Torrance County Livestock Show.
- 5. With exception of the Market Goat Class ALL OPEN CATTLE, HOGS, SHEEP, AND GOATS MUST BE FEMALES.

- 6. No stalling or feeding of livestock is permitted in the rodeo arena. The rodeo arena may be used for competing horses only when it does not conflict with the contest schedule.
- 7. Exhibitors must be present during the fitting and grooming of their animals.
- 8. ANIMALS WILL BE ALLOWED TO BE RELEASED AND REMOVED FROM FAIRGROUNDS IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING EACH SHOW. All exhibitors must fill out a release form for all animals to be released, and it must be signed and certified by the superintendents, unless other arrangements are made with the Superintendent of the Department. Exhibitors must have a signed release form prior to exiting the fairgrounds. Pens and Stalls must be cleaned prior to release.
- 9. THERE WILL BE NO FEEDING ALLOWED ON THE GROUND IN THE PENS, SUCH AS LOOSE HAY, LOOSE GRAIN, ETC. FEED IS ALLOWED IN PENS AS LONG AS IT IS CONTAINED.
- 10. Any animal shown in a breeding class shall show predominate breed characteristics.
- 11. Federal and state sanitation regulations apply.
- 12. Ethics: The use of any product or substance administered internally or used externally to alter the appearance or confirmation of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the use of graphite's, powders, dyes, hemp, false tail heads, glued-on hair, or hair-like substances.

### 13. UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE WHOLESOME MEAT ACT

a. The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock sold during the Torrance County Fair as follows: a) Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues. b) Antibiotics and sulfonamides have required withdrawal periods. c) Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed. d) If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue carcasses; the entire carcass may be condemned. If drug or other chemical residues are found in the tissue of carcasses of animals sold through the sale, said show will in no way be liable or responsible for the condition of a carcass or sale price of an animal. Any cost incurred by the Torrance County Fair Board for the testing of any suspected animals will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Exhibitor forfeits premium awards and all rights to sale price. These rules must be strictly adhered to whether there is competition or not.


### \*\*SEE 2022 GUIDE FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS\*\*

- 14. Exhibitors must furnish display cases, cages, feed, and necessary equipment.
- 15. All animals, at all times, must be kept thoroughly groomed and clean. Stalls and pens must be kept neat and supplied with clean, approved bedding. Goats, Sheep, and Dairy Heifers will use only sand for bedding. Cedar chips/shavings may be used in the steer/swine barns. *It is the owners' responsibility to provide cedar chips/shavings for swine/steer bedding.* Pathways and approaches must be kept clean for the convenience of spectators.
- 16. Youth not old enough to be enrolled in 4-H or FFA are eligible to exhibit in the "Open" breeding female classes. No prize money is offered for Open class exhibits at this time. Exhibitors in the Open Class must be 8 years of age or younger and able to exhibit and handle the animal.
- 17. Any animal causing disturbance or undue delay will be disqualified.
- 18. Exhibitors must be present to show or sell their animals or must be excused by the Fair Board. An exhibitor with two or more animals in one class will be allowed to have a substitute show the extra animal(s). Substitutes are limited to participants who are entered in other projects in the fair (4-H or FFA members in good standing with entries in the fair).

- 19. **BOOSTER SHOW:** Youth who are too young to be enrolled in 4-H or FFA are eligible to show in this event for Swine, Lambs, Market Goats and Dairy Goats. All animals will need to be tagged in animals at the Torrance County Fair and have been inspected by the NM Livestock Inspector. Any youth wishing to show may contact an exhibitor and ask if he/she may show this animal for the booster show.
- 20. Animals sifted must be removed from the livestock area immediately.
- 21. If any animal is not shown in a class, it cannot be sent to the packer.
- 22. Barrow or gilts may be shown in the Market Hog class. Wether or ewe lambs may be shown in the Market Lamb class. Wethers or does may be shown in the Market Goat class.
- 23. All showmanship classes will be judged by the judge of each show. Showmanship is judged as a separate class of each livestock show. The exhibitor must show his/her own animal.

NOTE: SHOWMANSHIP WILL BE SEPARATED INTO NOVICE, JUNIOR, AND SENIOR CLASSES FOR ALL JR LIVESTOCK DIVISIONS. ALL ENTRIES WILL BE ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN THEIR BREED AND AGE GROUP. ROSETTES WILL BE PRESENTED TO CLASS WINNERS, AND A CHAMPION SHOWMANSHIP WINNER FOR EACH SPECIES WILL BE ANNOUNCED DURING THAT SPECIES SHOW AND PRESENTED A BUCKLE.

- 24. NO ENTRY WILL BE CONSIDERED COMPLETE UNTIL ALL FEES AND CHARGES HAVE BEEN PAID IN FULL AT TIME OF CHECK-IN AT THE FAIR. INSUFFICIENT FUND CHECKS ARE CONSIDERED NON-PAYMENT
- 25. Any exhibitor sending animals to packer must ensure animals arrival to designated area set by the fair board and verify packer amount that will be mailed to the exhibitor.
- 26. A \$25.00 fee per pen will be invoiced to any exhibitor who does not clean his/her pen before checking out with the superintendent.
- 27. No market animals may be owned or exhibited in a partnership or jointly owned. However, animals may be transferred between immediate family members (i.e., brothers and sisters) at the time of classification. Animals may not be transferred from 4-H Club to FFA or vice versa after the ownership deadline.
- 28. All final classification decisions remain with the show judge and any classification discrepancies will be based on his/her opinion. The animal will be required to show in crossbred show for swine and black faced show for lambs.
- 29. Participants are not allowed to glue or use synthetics on the bodies of cattle including the flank, stifle, forerib, and chest floor in the show besides on their legs.



### JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE

### Friday, August 12th, 2022, 6:00pm Wayne Connell—Auctioneer

- 1. Animals eligible to sell are: Market Steers, Market Lambs, Market Hogs, Dairy Heifers, Market Goats, Rabbits and Poultry Meat pens exhibited in the "Junior Division."
- 2. Final determination of the addition or deletion of animals will be made after the classes are determined by the sale committee.
- 3. The sale declaration will be prepared Thursday evening by the Sale Committee after the Junior Livestock Sale animals have been designated.
- 4. Each exhibitor is permitted a maximum of two (2) sale slots. There is no limit to the number permitted to sell at packer's bid.
- 5. A packer's bid on all sale stock is obtained and announced at the sale. This bid is used as the price floor on bidding. PACKER BIDS MAY BE RESTRICTED TO WEIGHTS GREATER THAN THE MINIMUM WEIGHTS.
- 6. Exhibitors are responsible for the care and safe delivery of all animals sold through the Junior Livestock Sale and/or to the packer until animals are loaded to leave the grounds and exhibitors assist with the loading of the animals on the trucks or trailers in specified areas.

# 7. <u>ALL GLITTER, GLUE, ADHESIVES, ETC., MUST BE REMOVED FROM ALL SALE ANIMALS AFTER THE SALE, PRIOR TO SHIPMENT.</u>

- A 3% fee will automatically be deducted from the sale price of each animal going through the sale to cover the cost of a photograph and a calendar, which will be mailed to the buyer of the animals. One picture per sale slot will be provided by the Torrance County Fair Board.
- 8. If any packer docks the price on an animal because of weight or any other undesirable characteristics, this dock is passed on to the exhibitor sending the animal to the packer.
- 9. Any junior exhibitor having animals entered in the sale is prohibited from seeking special privileges from buyers, such as asking permission to re-purchase/exchange the animal from the buyer or packer to be shown again or to be used for other purposes. Any exhibitor who seeks privileges will be subject to such disciplinary action as deemed necessary by the Torrance County Fair Board, including withholding of sale price.
- 10. The official sale weight for animals going through the sale will be the weigh-in weight for shows. The official sale weight for animals going to the packer is the weigh-in weights for show minus shrinkage as required by the packer.
- 11. NO PREMIUM, ADD-ON, OR SALE MONIES WILL BE ISSUED TO ANY EXHIBITOR UNTIL ALL SUCH MONEY IS RECEIVED FROM DONORS AND BUYERS. EVERY EFFORT IS MADE TO INVOICE BUYERS IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE FAIR SO THE FUNDS CAN BE DISTRIBUTED TO YOUTH AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.

All ranch-raised steers must be declared at the time of tag-in. The steer must have a registered NM brand from a ranch located in Torrance County or surrounding area. The brand must come from a ranch that has not produced club calves within the past 20 years. The exhibitor must provide an affidavit from the breeder showing proof of purchase and stating the origin of the calf. The beef superintendent will verify eligibility at tag-in. Steers will be shown in a natural state. No clipping, singeing, fitting, etc. will be allowed after tag-in. If the superintendent deems that the steer has been altered after tag-in, the superintendent has the authority to disqualify the steer from the county fair. #### Rules

- 1. To be eligible contestants must be residents of Torrance County or attend a Torrance County school.
- Major articles of clothing must be hand or homemade of at least 60% wool. Non-wool
  accessories are permissible and do not have to be hand-made, but ready-made wool
  garments are not permissible. The outfit should be in step with current fashion and
  compliment the contestant.
- 3. Clothing construction will be judged only as it affects the final appearance of the garment on the contestant. Garments should fit well and be neatly constructed.
- 4. The pre-school, novice, and junior division will not be allowed to show a ewe. They will only model their garments.
- 5. The senior division contestants must show on halter a purebred two tooth yearling ewe only. The contestant need not own the ewe. No ewe may be shown by more than one contestant.
- 6. The ewe should be attractively fitted and groomed, but not colored or in any way artificially prepared for the show. The ewe should be clean (washing of ewes optional), smoothly blocked-in long wool (wool should be at least one-inch-long), in good condition, alert, stylish, and well-balanced.
- 7. The ewe should respond calmly to the halter and stand quietly when handled by the judge. Ease and calmness in handling the ewe will contribute significantly to good showmanship.
- 8. Poise, grooming, balance, and attitude of the contestant and ewe will be judged. Hair style, makeup, and accessories should enhance the total appearance.
- 9. Stall facilities will be provided.
- 10. Entry forms must include an information and commentary sheet about the contestant and his/her sheep. This information/commentary can include things such as hobbies, where contestant attends school, 4-H/FFA club activities, school activities, etc. This information will assist in the introduction of each contestant and commentary given while he/she is modeling in the contest.

- 11. Ewes must be on the grounds by 12:00pm, Tuesday, August 9th, 2022, to go through animal check-in procedures, and they will be released immediately after the contest.
- 12. The superintendent reserves the right to combine classes to best suit the needs of the class.



THE GENERAL RULES FOR THE TORRANCE COUNTY FAIR APPLY EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE STATED BELOW. THESE SPECIAL RULES TAKE PRECEDENCE OVER ALL OTHER RULES.

Check-in all indoor exhibits including special cake on Tuesday, August 9<sup>th</sup>, 2022 between 9:00am to 7:00pm. Check-in all Floriculture Exhibits on Tuesday, August 9<sup>th</sup>, 2022 between 1:00pm and 5:00pm. Exhibit check-out will be on Friday, August 12<sup>th</sup>, 2022 ONLY, from 3:00pm to 6:00pm.

- 1. Indoor exhibit hall is under the authorization and discretion of the Indoor General Superintendent.
- 2. Only one entry per class, per individual, will be accepted.
- 3. Articles must be the handicraft of the exhibitor.
- 4. Differences in entry numbers will be signified by class number, plus J-for Junior class entries and S-for Senior class entries.
- 5. Each department will be divided as follows: Youth: 0-17 years of age; Adult: 18 years and over; Professional: Anyone who either teaches or sells for profit or is employed in the field; Special (challenged) Junior and Senior
- 6. A plaque will be awarded to "Best of Show" youth and senior division in each department.
- 7. EVERY article must be CLEAN, hung and ready to display, NOT EXHIBITED PREVIOUSLY, and must have been made by the exhibitor after September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021. (No dirty entries will be accepted under any circumstances).
- 8. Exhibits may be sold during the fair but not removed until Friday, August 12th, 2022.
- 9. Every precaution will be taken for the safety of all entries, but in no case will the Torrance County Fair be responsible for damage or loss of any exhibit.
- 10. NO ONE is allowed to remove any entry or entries from the building without the Superintendent check-out approval.
- 11. Articles that do not meet the requirements of judging competition will be exhibited if space is available.
- 12. If an item is brought that does not fit into a specific class listed in the Fair Book, the General Superintendent may create another category at the time of entry if there are at least three entries. If there are not three of the same item in any one category, the superintendent may put them all in a miscellaneous category.
- 13. Judge's decisions will be final.
- 14. ENTRIES MUST BE CHECKED OUT AFTER 3:00 PM ON FRIDAY, AUGUST 12th, 2022.

## **FINE ARTS**

All entries, excluding free-standing articles and sculptures, must be framed and ready to hang. Every precaution will be taken for the safety of all entries, but in no case will the Torrance County Fair Board be responsible for damage to any entry. The artist should carry his/her own insurance if needed.

1. The "General rules of the Torrance County Fair" and the rules of the "Indoor Exhibit Division" apply with the following exceptions:

**REMINDER** 1: STUDENT, JUNIOR, PRE-JUNIOR OR SPECIAL NEEDS exhibits may be mounted on stiff backing, matted, or may be framed and wired to hang.

**REMINDER 2:** All adult entries must be framed and wired to hang.

**REMINDER** 3: An exhibitor may exhibit one (1) entry in each class.

- 2. The Torrance County Fair wishes to encourage participation in the Fine Arts Department and will do its best to exhibit all work qualified. However, due to limited space, it must reserve the right to limit exhibition as space allows.
- 3. Entry classifications will be divided as follows:
  - PROFESSIONALS: Someone who derives a portion of their income from the sale on an item.
  - SENIOR: Over the age of 18 as of January 1st, 2022.
  - JUNIOR: Ages 12 to 18 years as of January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022.
  - PRE-JUNIOR: Ages 12 and under as of January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022.
  - STUDENT: Entries in this division must be pre-selected and entered by teachers
    of students enrolled in the Torrance County School District. Work must be done
    by students and completed since the last Torrance County Fair. This class was
    created to encourage student participation in art. We would welcome help from
    teachers in this endeavor. Teachers as "class exhibitors" may exhibit three (3)
    entries per school class (i.e., 1st grade, 2nd, etc). Student Classes will be divided
    as follows:
  - Teacher must pre-enter or be present at time of entering

9th—12th grades (combination class)

7th—8th grades (combination class)

K—6th grades (a separate class for each grade)

Entries may not be taken from youth.

All entries must have been made after the Torrance County Fair, September 2021.

Class will be divided by media, and if entries warrant categories such as landscape, etc., as the rules state, there must be three (3) entries to create a new category.

Exhibitor must state which piece will be judged if no new class is formed.

People's Choice will be voted on.

# Torrance County Fair 2022 A NGC Small Standard Flower Show

Superintendent: Shari Anaya 505-363-9410 Co-superintendent: Debby Maberry 505-448-2254

This show is sponsored by the Moriarty Garden Club, a member of New México Garden Clubs. Inc., and National Garden Clubs, Inc. The Standard System of Awards shall be used according to the National Garden Clubs, Inc. Handbook for Flower Shows, Revised 2017. The Torrance County Fair General Rules and the Indoor Exhibit Division Rules apply EXCEPT as stated below.

## General floriculture rules, Divisions I, II, III, and IV:

- This flower show is for amateur gardeners only. An amateur is any person who is involved in gardening or floriculture for pleasure only. This person does not now and has never derived income from his/her gardening or floriculture hobby. You don't have to be a member of any garden club or plant society to enter this show. This show is open to all amateur gardeners.
- 2. Entries will be accepted on Tuesday, August 9 from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM at the Torrance County Fair Grounds, Estancia NM. Please enter the Indoor Exhibit Building through the west door. Amateur gardeners ages 18 and over may enter the Senior Division. Ages 4 through 17 may enter the Youth Division. Judging will take place on Wednesday, August 10, between 9:00 AM and noon.
- 3. The exhibit will be open to the public from 1:00 PM until 6:00 PM on Wednesday, from 9:00 AM to 6 PM on Thursday, and from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM on Friday, August 12.
- 4. Artificial plant material (e.g. silk flowers or leaves, artificial fruit or vegetables) will not be accepted in any division. Exhibits may not exceed 36 inches in height or 24 inches in width.
- 5. Entry tags will be supplied by the flower show committee and must be used. Tags must be filled out completely by the exhibitor except in the Youth divisions. Tags may be obtained prior to the show from the Superintendent.
- 6. All entries must be passed by the Superintendent or designee. When appropriate, exhibitors will be informed if an entry does not conform to the schedule requirements and will be asked to make the necessary changes. If that is not possible the exhibit may be displayed and marked "not for competition" and therefore will not be eligible for judging.
- 7. Only the judges, clerks, and flower show superintendents will be in the exhibition area during judging. Judging will be done by accredited Flower Show judges in accordance with the standards and practices established by National, Garden Clubs, Inc. The decision of the judges is final.
- 8. All horticultural entries, except container grown plants, become the property of the show committee and will not be returned unless specific arrangements are made at the time of entry. Wilted and damaged exhibits will be removed during the show. Although reasonable supervision will be given, the Garden Club, Torrance County Fair, or its sponsors will not be liable for any loss of property.

- **9.** Design entries, container grown entries, and awards may be picked up on Friday between 2:00 and 3:00 PM. Items not picked up by the close of the show (3:00 PM) may need to be left unsupervised.
- **10.** Plant material on the protected list of the Wildflower Law of New Mexico must be labeled with the common AND botanical names and must have been legally obtained from personal property in order to be accepted.

#### **AWARDS**

- 1. The standard system of Judging and Awarding will be used. The Standard System allows only one first place ribbon (blue) scoring 90 or above, one second place ribbon (red) scoring 85 or above, and one third place ribbon scoring 85 or above in each class or subclass, if merited. One or more honorable mention ribbons scoring 75 or above may be given if merited.
- Two Torrance County Sweepstakes Plaques will be awarded. One goes to the Senior exhibitor accumulating the most blue ribbons, and one goes to the Youth exhibitor accumulating the most blue ribbons.
- 3. Only botanically named (genus, species, and/or cultivars) exhibits will be eligible for Top Awards in Division II, Senior Horticulture. Best of Section Certificates plus \$5.00 will be awarded in each of the horticultural divisions. A certificate and \$5.00 will be awarded for Best of Section to each class in the Design Division. A Best of Show Award will be awarded in both the Horticulture and Design divisions, plus \$10.00. A People's Choice Award will be given to the best design voted by the general public.
- 4. A Best of Section Award plus \$5.00 will be awarded in each section of Division I, Youth Horticulture. Also a Best of Show Certificate plus \$10.00 will be awarded in that division.

#### **Special rules for Horticulture Entries**

- 1. All exhibits must be fresh plant material grown by the exhibitor for at least 6 weeks.
- 2. The exhibitor is responsible for correctly identifying his/her entries. However, Flower Show Committee members will be present to assist.
- 3. Exhibitors must place their horticulture entries in containers provided, fill out tags, and present entries to the Superintendent designee for final acceptance.
- 4. Exhibits must be fresh, free of insects, diseases, or spray residues. Length of stem should be in proportion to the size of bloom as species permits. One stem is placed per container except where otherwise noted in the schedule. **No wiring, oiling, enhancement spray or artificial coloring is permitted.**
- 5. An exhibitor may enter more than one specimen per class or subclass if each is a different species, variety/cultivar, type, size, or color, ,
- 6. Except for trees, shrubs, herbs, and plants entered for foliage only, a stem must have at least one bloom. Only foliage that is naturally attached to the stem will be accepted. Gladiolas are exhibited with 2 leaves: Dahlias are exhibited with no leaves.
- 7. No foliage should appear below the water line. Wedging is permitted. (Wedging is a "plug" made from clear plastic wrap placed in the neck of the container to support the specimen.)
- 8. Container grown plants must be in the exhibitor's possession and grown in the display containers for at least 8 weeks (by June 14). Pots must be clean and not exceed 12 inches, except for hanging plants (14 in.), and container gardens (16 in.)

**Suggestions for Exhibitors:** Cut specimens in early morning or the night before from a well-watered bed. Cut stems again while under water. Place specimens immediately in warm water and set in a cool **place** for several hours. Groom specimens by removing dead blooms, seed heads, and disfigured, discolored, and damaged leaves and flower petals. Remove all evidence of dirt, insect, or spray residue. Remove leaves that will be below water.

## Division III: Design – Special Rules

- 1. All entries must be the original work of the exhibitor. A design entered in any previous Standard Flower Show may not be entered in any succeeding show.
- 2. Plant materials used may be grown by the exhibitor, purchased, or obtained from other legitimate sources unless otherwise stated in the class or sub-class description.
- 3. No artificial plant material and no artificially colored plant material may be used in any class.

- 4. Dried plant material may be treated, e.g. preserved with glycerine,; fresh plant materials may NOT be treated or dyed.
- 5. Decorative wood is considered a dried plant material and is not permitted in classes specifying all fresh material nor may it be used as the only plant material in a design. Fruits and vegetables are fresh plant materials; if they are cut they must be unobtrusively sealed to discourage insects, odor, or discoloration.
- 6. Backgrounds of 36" or less and underlays may be used, but must be provided by the exhibitor.
- 7. Plants on the state protected list are permitted if grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a lawful manner.
- 8. Any design may be sub-titled or explained on a 3"x5" card if the exhibitor wishes.
- 9. All designs must be accompanied by a 3"x5" card listing at least the common names of all plant material used. Botanical names may be added.
- 10. Designs must not exceed 34" in height or 24" in width or depth.
- 11. Division III entries will be judged according to the rules published in the National Garden Clubs, Inc.'s judging handbook.

Section A: "Holidays missed in 2021"

Class 1. "Easter". A traditional mass design depicting a joyful Easter celebration using all fresh material, suitable for a table center piece. An accessory no taller than the total height of the plant material used is permitted.

Class 2." Fourth of July". A line design illustrating the patriotism and fun of the day. It should be appropriate for a buffet or for an entry way, must use all fresh materials, and may include an accessory no taller than ½ the total height of the design.

Class 3." Thanksgiving". A line-mass design suitable for a buffet or end table to be seen from the front only, incorporating both fresh and dried materials. No accessories may be used.

Section B:"The Wind At My Back"

Class 1. "Sun, Wind, - and Rain?" - A mass design to be seen from all sides, depicting the multi-cultural nature of New Mexico and comprised of both fresh and dried materials. An accessory no taller than 1/3 of the total design may be used

Class 2. "Dust in the Wind" - A line-mass design to be viewed from the front only expressing summers in Torrance County. Both fresh and dried plant material may be used. No accessories are permitted.

Class 3. "The Calm After the Storm". A line-mass design to be seen from 3 sides only and incorporating all fresh material. No accessories are permitted.
